1. Chair Martin Wegenstein called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m. A quorum was established, and Maria Montiel took roll call.

2. PUBLIC COMMENTS

Hans Hoffman noted that signage is needed on Reservation Road.

4. DEL MONTE/ CASA VERDE REC TRAIL INTERSECTION IMPROVEMENT PROJECT

The Committee received a presentation on the construction phase of the Del Monte/Casa Verde Recreational Trail Intersection Improvement Project and provided feedback to City of Monterey staff on construction planning and community impact.

Andrew Easterling, Engineer at the City of Monterey reported that the Del Monte/ Casa Verde Recreational Trail Intersection Improvement Project was initiated following concerns raised by the Del Monte Beach Neighborhood regarding the safety and functionality of this crossing. He noted that the project addresses critical safety concerns for all modes of transportation at a high-traffic intersection that connects residential areas, schools, and commercial zones. In conclusion Mr. Easterling noted that extensive community outreach, including a virtual public meeting and a dedicated project webpage, gathered input on the design.

The Committee had the following comments and input on the Del Monte/Casa Verde Recreational Trail Intersection Improvement Project:

- Consider reaching out to Bay View Academy school
- Consider setting back the bike bollards from any turns on trails
- Consider reaching out to the Naval Post Graduate School
- Consider having safety measures for all ages
- Consider yellow or orange paint for crosswalks visibility
- Consider having enough crosswalk time to get across
- Consider scooters and skaters
- Consider having more education

5. MOVING WITH PURPOSE – VIDEO INTERVIEW SAMPLES

The Committee received a presentation on the Walk and Roll Testimonials Project and provided feedback to Transportation Agency staff.

Ariadne Sambrano, Transportation Planner, reported that the Moving with purpose Project captures and shares personal stories from the Monterey County community that highlight the experiences and challenges of those who walk or bike in their daily lives. She noted that the testimonials from Greg Hamer and Nathalie Gomez showcase varied experiences and provide key insights for promoting active transportation.

The Committee had the following comments and feedback on the Moving with purpose Project:

- Consider close captioning
- Consider interviewing bicyclist at trails in the moment
- Consider having interviewers on their bikes
- Consider audio quality keep in mind outdoors the wind can make it hard to hear interviewer
- Consider asking one question so bicyclists can provide more context to a question
- Consider having the interviewers voice included in the video
- Consider interviewing Kevin Phillips he might have an interesting story
- Consider exploring the TikTok media platform
- Consider other languages like Spanish
- Liked the script video caption
- Consider interviewing all modes of transportation walking, biking, skating and on scooters
- Recommended looking at other video interview examples that are trending online

6. LEGISLATIVE UPDATE

The Committee received an update on state legislative issues.

Christina Watson, Director of Planning, reported an update on state legislative activities. Ms. Watson went over the Bills of particular interest to the Bicycle and Pedestrian Facilities Advisory Committee that are still moving and have been updated as of August 2024, include the following:

• SB 960 (Wiener) Transportation: planning: complete streets facilities: transit priority facilities - As amended July 3, this bill would require Caltrans to adopt a transit priority policy to guide the implementation of transit priority facilities on the state highway system. She noted that TAMC has a support position on this bill.

• SB 1216 (Blakespear) Transportation projects: Class III bikeways: prohibition - As amended on July 3, this bill prohibits an agency from installing a sharrow on a highway where bicycle travel is permitted that has a posted speed limit greater than 30 mph and prohibits CTC from adding a project that creates a Class III bikeway or a sharrow to the program of projects. This bill is similar to AB 2290; TAMC has a watch position on this bill.

Committee member Jeff Wridt noted that sharrows are mostly everywhere over 35 mph. Christina Watson replied that committee members can send letters (as individuals, not representing the TAMC BPC) to the Governor with concern about SB 1216 (Blakespear), the bill that would prohibit sharrows on a road with a speed greater than 30 mph.

7. <u>ANNOUNCEMENTS AND/OR COMMENTS</u>

Committee Member Eric Petersen announced that the Sand City Race was well done.

Committee Member Katie Stern announced that the West End Celebration bike valet was great, and no spots were available.

Committee Member Ralph Wege expressed concerns on the class 3 e-bikes and noted that speeds on rec trail are bad.

Committee member Marzette Henderson announced the Coastal Commission Hearing for SURF! Project will be held on September 12.

Committee Member Ernie Gallardo announced the Safe Routes to School in Greenfield.

Subject: Monterey County Zero Emissions Shared Mobility Study

RECOMMENDED ACTION:

RECEIVE a presentation on the Monterey County Zero Emissions Shared Mobility Study and **PROVIDE** feedback to County of Monterey staff.

SUMMARY:

The Monterey County Zero Emissions Shared Mobility Study aims to identify and evaluate innovative zero-emissions shared mobility solutions to meet transportation needs throughout the county. The study will develop sustainable and equitable solutions, including zero-emission carsharing, carpooling, bike/scooter sharing, and enhanced public transit.

FINANCIAL IMPACT:

The County of Monterey received a Sustainable Communities Competitive Grant for fiscal year 2022-23 to fund this effort.

DISCUSSION:

The Monterey County Zero Emissions Shared Mobility Study is designed to address transportation challenges in the county by promoting clean mobility alternatives and reducing the reliance on single-occupancy vehicles. The County of Monterey-led project will gather input from regional stakeholders, local residents, and employers to identify transportation needs, especially for underserved communities like low-income Latino populations, farmworkers, and hospitality employees. Through surveys, public forums, and stakeholder engagement, the project will evaluate potential shared mobility solutions that can reduce vehicle miles traveled and improve transportation access.

Key components of the study include:

- Zero Emissions Vehicle (ZEV) carsharing,
- ZEV carpooling and vanpooling,
- Bike and scooter sharing,
- · Improved access to transit, and
- Enhanced public transit services.

The study will also assess existing regional transportation networks, congestion issues, and current mobility gaps in the county. Extensive outreach will be conducted to ensure that proposed solutions are tailored to the diverse geography and demographics of Monterey County. Recommendations will focus on providing affordable, sustainable, and equitable transportation options, particularly for

farmworkers and hospitality employees, and will align with broader county efforts to reduce greenhouse gas emissions and adapt to climate change.

The study will build upon previous efforts, such as:

- MST 2020 Comprehensive Operational Analysis,
- TAMC 2018 Active Transportation Plan,
- Central Coast ZEV Strategy, and
- Various local climate action plans.

County of Monterey staff invites committee members to actively participate in the planned listening sessions, advisory groups, and community forums, offering input and assisting in the dissemination of the survey when it goes live. Additionally, the Bicycle and Pedestrian Committee will play a key role in providing feedback, ensuring the study addresses the transportation needs of Monterey County, and helping with outreach efforts.

Subject: Review of Project Delivery Stages and Community Engagement

RECOMMENDED ACTION:

RECEIVE a presentation by staff reviewing the typical stages of a capital project, including the need for community engagement.

SUMMARY:

Many agencies in Monterey County manage numerous capital projects that have the potential to improve bike and pedestrian service. Staff will make a presentation on the project delivery stages and strategies used to engage the community as the project gets ready for construction.

FINANCIAL IMPACT:

Incorporating pedestrian and bicycle features into a project can often be achieved at a marginal cost. Other times, these features cannot be added to a project without significantly increasing the cost, adding unexpected environmental review or expanding the scope of work beyond the limits of the project's purpose and need. In some cases, the funding source may not allow for these additional features and associated costs. Agencies must balance the needs of all roadway users against limited resources available to fund these projects.

DISCUSSION:


Staff will review the typical stages of project delivery for capital projects. This presentation will highlight how the project manager can enhance community engagement. The project scope of work can be revised at key stages. Staff will review strategies stakeholders and advocates can use to address pedestrian and bike issues. The effective implementation of these desired outcomes must be balanced by the agency's limited resources and constraints associated with funding sources. For example, a road pavement project may be funded by a source that does not allow the project to obtain property for the right-of-way required to add a sidewalk or bike lane.

Subject: Title VI & Language Assistance Plan

RECOMMENDED ACTION:

RECEIVE presentation on TAMC Title VI and Language Assistance Plan for 2024-2027, and **COMPLETE** the Title VI committee representation survey.

SUMMARY:

Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 prohibits recipients of federal financial assistance from discriminating on the basis of race, color, or national origin in their programs or activities. As a recipient of federal funds, TAMC is required to prepare a Title VI Program and Language Assistance Plan to establish a policy of nondiscrimination.

FINANCIAL IMPACT:

Receipt of federal funding is cotingent on adoption of a Title VI Program and Language Assistance Plan. Staff time required to implement the Title VI Program and Language Assistance Plan was budgeted under the Transportation Development Act administration.

DISCUSSION:

Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 is a federal statue that prohibits recipients of Federal financial assistance from discriminating on the basis of race, color, or national origin in their programs or activities, and it obligates federal funding agencies to enforce statutory compliance. Pursuant to Executive Order 13166: Improving Access to Service for Persons with Limited English Proficiency (LEP), LEP persons are entitled to language assistance under Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964. Federal assistance recipients shall take reasonable steps to ensure meaningful access to benefits, services, information, and other important portions of their programs and activities.

The Federal Transit Administration's (FTA) guidelines for Caltrans, as a recipient of FTA funding assistance, require sub-recipients of Caltrans Planning Grants to submit a Title VI Plan to FTA every three years. As a Caltrans grant sub-recipient and as the Regional Transportation Planning Agency for Monterey County, the Transportation Agency is required to comply with FTA requirements associated with the use of these funds.

The Transportation Agency's Title VI Program and Language Assistance Plan provides guidance on administration and management of Title VI related activities. The Transportation Agency's Title VI Program and Language Assistance Plan includes the following:

- The definition and significance of Title VI and Limited English Proficiency
- The Transportation agency's commitment to meeting the statuary and reporting requirements

of Title VI

- A public participation plan, demographic profile and a summary of outreach efforts for Monterey County
- The Language Assistance Plan, including an analysis of the potential number of Limited English Proficiency persons served by the Transportation Agency's programs and projects, the frequency with which staff contact Limited English Proficiency persons, the significance of programs to Limited English Proficiency persons, and the services available to Limited English Proficiency persons
- Language Assistance Plan Implementation strategies
- Title VI complaint process and forms

Staff is currently updating the Agency's Title VI Plan to reflect updated demographic data and new information on the strategies for reaching Monterey County's LEP community. The updated plan details resources the Agency has access to and the outreach strategies employed to reach the LEP community.

Updated demographic data on language the following safe harbor languages: Spanish and Tagalog. Safe Harbor languages are those that meet the threshold of 5% or 1,000 persons, whichever is less, of the total population eligible to be served or likely to be affected or encountered by the Agency that speak English "less than very well" according to the U.S. Census.

The Agency is required to have vital documents available in each of these languages. Vital documents are generally those that affect access to, retention in, or termination or exclusion from a program, service or benefit. Examples of vital documents include the Title VI complaint forms and written notices of rights. In addition to providing translation of vital documents in the safe harbor languages, the agency is required to provide materials in alternative languages if requested. The agency has access to an on-call interpretation service and document translation services.

As a reporting requirement, the Agency is required to include a table reflecting non-elected committee member race/ethnicity demographics. Committee members are strongly encouraged to complete a survey on race/ethnicity, which will be electronically provided during the Committee meeting and is alternatively linked to this report as a **web attachment**.

The updated Title VI Plan is scheduled for TAMC Board approval at their December 4, 2024 meeting.
